



Annual Graduation Ceremony 2025

It is hard to believe we have reached the end of another school year – and what a year it has been! The Graduation Ceremony for our Form Six graduates was held on the afternoon of 5th July 2025. Our distinguished alumna, Ms. Leung Yuet Yin, Esther, JP, served as Guest of Honour and delivered an inspiring speech (excerpts below).



Sister Veronica, Principal, Ms June Sieh, Ms Rebecca Tsang, Mrs Janet Lai, teachers, parents, Secondary 6 graduates, ladies and gentlemen,

Good afternoon. I am most honoured to have been invited to be the officiating guest at the Secondary 6 graduation ceremony of St Francis Canossian College today.

May I first of all congratulate all the Secondary 6 graduates for your hard work and achievements over the years. I should also like to congratulate the Principal, teachers and parents for your dedicated and selfless efforts in guiding, supporting, and bringing up these graduates during their formative years.

Having spent a total of 13 years studying, learning and growing up here some 40 years ago, St Francis has always been my dearest second home in my life. This is also a memorable occasion for me as I belonged to the first cohort of Form 7 graduates having our graduation ceremony in this school hall which was newly completed in 1985, exactly 40 years ago. Though the new and modern school building today is not the same as the one I was familiar with, my memories of St Francis remain fresh and warm every time I come back to our school here.

For instance, I can still remember having mock exams in the cold rainy weather inside the cover playground when the school hall had yet been constructed. I can also remember paying 50 cents as penalty for each Cantonese word spoken during an English lesson. I will also not forget doing manual proof-reading for all the written scripts for the special school magazine for the 110th Anniversary because there was no computer in school those days.

Few months ago, at the Principal's invitation, I took part in conducting mock university admission interviews with some of the Form 6 students in school. I was very pleased with their overall performance in terms of their positive attitude, general knowledge and communication skills. They are indeed much smarter and brighter than I and classmates at their age some decades ago.

However, I note that almost no one indicated their wish to join the public service after finishing their studies.

This is no surprise to me. After all, entering the public service does not appear to be a very popular career choice amongst teenage students nowadays. I should therefore like to take this opportunity to encourage all the graduates to have an open mind to consider pursuing your career in the public sector some time in future, whether you are a teacher, a lawyer, a doctor, an accountant, an engineer, an IT specialist, a social worker, an architect, an arts and cultural administrator etc. The public sector includes not only the Government, but also public organizations like the public hospitals, universities, schools and other subvented organizations.

I have been working as an administrative officer in the Government for around 30 years and then in the Judiciary for five years in my current position as the Judiciary Administrator. Throughout the past 35 years, I witnessed quite a number of significant historical changes in Hong Kong. Despite the many challenges from these changes, I have no hesitation to say that serving the public has been a most worthy, meaningful and rewarding career.

During my civil service career, I felt very blessed and fortunate to have been involved in quite a number of major policy initiatives with a lasting impact on the community. One of the most impressive experience was related to the regularization of football betting (足球博彩規範化) in the face of strong oppositions from schools and Christian communities back in 2003. We fought a hard battle striking a proper balance between combatting illegal betting and avoiding encouraging gambling. Thanks be to God-this gave me the opportunity not only to put in place a proper regulatory system, but also to set up the first two service centres for problem and pathological gambling in Hong Kong.

Next in line is the development of the West Kowloon Cultural District (西九文化區) . From 2006 to 2008, I was the subject officer responsible for relaunching the entire public engagement exercise (推倒重來、重新諮詢) after the Government gave up the previous approach of building a single canopy (興建天幕) , and direct tendering from one single developer (單一招標) . When we started off this process at that time, the Government was actually not really confident that we could make it to the end. During those two years, I had been working days and nights with my team of colleagues on an intensive consultation and consensus building exercise with the diverse arts and cultural community (music, dance, drama, Cantonese Opera, visual arts etc.) including debating on the concept of M+ for the major museum we have today. We also needed to draw up a feasible financing model, draft the law for establishing the West Kowloon Cultural District Authority, and seek approval

from the then Legislative Council for the one-off funding injection of \$2.16 billion. I recalled that I personally did a total of at least 50 briefings and presentations on the proposals before they were finalized and approved. Again, with thanks to the guidance of God and the support from colleagues at all levels, we managed to go through all hurdles and our efforts paid off. And we are so happy to be able to enjoy the Cultural District now.

In my current position as the Judiciary Administrator, I have to provide the full range of administrative support to the Chief Justice and all the judges in upholding the rule of law and judicial independence in Hong Kong. These include all matters relating to manpower and resource management, legislation, court buildings, court operations and technology initiatives such as remote hearings and electronic filing, in ensuring the effective and efficient administration of justice. Our work has particularly been challenging over the past few years where we were to cope with an increasing caseload and longer court waiting times arising from Covid-19 pandemic, the upsurge of high-profile and national security cases, and insufficient judicial manpower. But our efforts have yielded positive results and been duly appreciated by court users.

All these public service projects are interesting, controversial and challenging in many ways. Despite the sweat and pains involved, there was enormous sense of satisfaction, excitement and fun from the teamwork experience, from engaging different stakeholders, and from the process of tackling complex issues, conflicting views and problems. Most important of all, the shared passion and commitment of civil service colleagues towards serving the public has brought with me fond memories and long-lasting friendships over the years.

As graduates of St Francis, joining the public service is one of the best and direct means of living the Franciscan spirit in our working life. As set out in the school motto of St Francis, 'Veritas In Charitate, Live by the Truth in Love', our core values which make up the Franciscan DHA has indeed made us most suited for serving the community in the public service.

Over the past decades, apart from the more prominent ones in top leading roles, there have been a lot of Franciscans serving competently in many different positions in the public sector. This may not be obvious to you all because Franciscan graduates tend to take a low profile generally. But it is not too difficult to recognize each other at work. Over the years, Franciscan civil servants have consistently been manifesting ourselves as most honest and reliable, dedicated and committed, principled and righteous; and most importantly, ready to serve with humility, and deliver responsibilities with integrity and without fear.

Here and now, the world has been changing rapidly with the increasing use of modern technology including generative AI. The geopolitical and socio-economic environment has also become more complex. The Government and the public service surely need to evolve and move with the times. That's why I should like to appeal to all the graduates, my fellow young Franciscans, bright, talented and capable young people, to consider joining the public service some time in your future career, bringing with you new, fresh, and innovative ideas. Let's work

together to make Hong Kong and our country a better place for everyone. Don't just complain and criticize the Government for not doing things well. Do join the public sector to bring about changes and improvements for the common good. This is for sure one of the best ways to realize the key message in our school song - "live St Francis, live forever".

Last but not least, I wish all graduates every happiness and success with God's blessings in your future endeavours. I also wish the Principal, teachers and support staff in St Francis continual achievements in bringing up good and responsible students. And finally to all parents and family members of graduates, I wish you all good luck and good health.



Alumni Column
